She was a fishing vessel - listed as fishing at first and later as a fish carrier

Disposition: 1914: November 25, 1914 - foundered near Duck Island, Isles of Shoals. Hailed from Boothbay, Maine when she sank.

"..a plank started by the pounding of heavy seas is supposed to have dropped from the vessel's bottom..." - "Fish-Carrying Schooner Went Down - Crew Lost," Altoona Tribune, Altoona, Pennsylvania, November 25, 1914. Actually the crew of three were saved by Portsmouth, New Hampshire fisherman, George Dobson. Probably: Dobson - George H. Dobson Jr. (1852-1937)
