Dobbs Productions of Bar Harbor has been making documentaries about Maine for almost three decades. Over twenty films, all seen on Maine Public Television and many of them have been broadcast on national PBS. Jack Perkins, formerly a NBC News commentator, bosted all of them, with three exceptions. "Wild Makine" a story about Maine's abundant wildlife, featured Jennifer Skiff, a former CNN reporter and Maine resident, and "The Lighthouses of Maine: A fourner Through Time" was hosted by Tim Harrison, president of the Arnerkan Lighthouse Association. The third. Entitled "Potrtati of an Island: The Story of Mount Desert Island," was bosted by 16ff Dobbs, himself, and was written by his friend Gunnar Hansen, star of the cult film "The Texas Chain Sun Massacre." The film was never aired on Maine Public Television, but it did receive some notoriety in the Bar Harbor Times. Over the years Dobbs Productions Maine documentaries have become a staple on Maine Public Television and many people, mostly Mainers, have enjoyed these films and especially the aerial views of the state, but documentaries in 'the only thing that Dobbs Productions does, so what else do they do besides tell stories about Maine and it' people?

Jeff Dobbs graduated from Emerson College, in 1972, with a bachelor's degree in Mass Communications, majoring in film. He began his career in still photography: but scenic and marine photography and his interest in maritime history led him to collect hundreds of old photographs of steamships, and all types of sailing vessels , from coasting schooners, and full rigged ships to America's Cup contenders. Dobbs used a sepia technique to give the photos a nostalgic look. Hundreds of these photos still hang in local restaurants, hotels and homes.

In the mid to late 1970's, Jeff had two stores, both named Down to the Sea In Ships, in Bar Harbor and in Northeast Elarbor, where he sold his sepia photographs and nautical brass. When cable television first came to Bar Harbor, Mr. Dobbs leased time on the local access channel and started Dobbs Productions. He rented some old video equipment from a production company in Bangor and with the help of an old college roommate, Doug Wornick, created "Shand Update", Maine's first cable tourist information channel.
